In Luke 16, Jesus told a parable about a man who entrusted his whole business to a man who turned out to be a crook. Luke 16.10, When he was found out, the manager cooked the books in order to make things look better, and so that when he was out of a job, he would get help from the people whose debts he had canceled.

Jesus often pointed out the dangers that money can cause, especially when people put money before God. We read that the Pharisees loved money. It would have been better if they had loved God instead.

So Jesus told this fact of life. If you are a crook in small things, you'll be a crook in big things. And no one will trust you. But if you are honest in small things, then you will be trusted with big things.

This is especially true when it comes to serving God and telling people about the true riches of the gospel. Sometimes people don't tell the whole truth of God's word. They don't like to tell people about sin and the consequences of sin, God's eternal judgment.
