But then Jesus said to him, you look wonderful, you're well. Don't return to a sinning life, or something worse might happen. Verse 14 from the message. We don't know if the man's illness had been a direct result of his sin, but Jesus clearly showed him how he should live a life from then on that was pleasing to God.
